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ADAPTING THROUGH ADVERSITY

Never has our need for resilience and adaptability been greater than it is in this moment. Fortunately for us, our newcomer students serve as inspirational role models of this tenacity and motivate us to achieve unconventional solutions to potential barriers to their learning.

In **Anglophone School District-South**, these unpredictable times have prompted a number of initiatives.

At the high school level, educators have identified English language learners working on English literacy skills at an CEFR A1 level and are supporting them so they can attend school daily.

In most cases, the students are assigned to their scheduled classrooms. However, in two high schools, with large numbers of language learners falling into this category, students are being supported with an additional teacher. As well, at these schools, a new position was created to support the Newcomer Support and Transition Plan (NSTP).

In grades 3-8, newly arrived English language learners working on English literacy skills at a CEFR A1 level, are taking part in a **Language Learning Centre** pilot. Students attend classes focused on developing their English literacy and numeracy skills and on how to navigate the "hidden curriculum" (Jackson, 1968) of school in New Brunswick, Canada.

NEW WAYS OF DOING

Educators and EAL Mentors in ASD-S have been involved in creating online access to curricular content and literacy support for English language learners. Some mentors are now supporting students in rural areas through the online TEAMs platform.

This summer, educator Mallory Cunningham, a teacher at Saint John High School, worked alongside a team of other K-12 EAL educators to complete online course modules for B1.1 and B1.2 level English language learners. Mallory and her colleagues created interactive modules, covering topics such as careers, identity, music, portfolio building and more. Mallory is now able to use these online modules daily in her classroom to guide her teaching. She notes that this has aided in teaching the students about using technology and that the students are really enjoying the themes. "It has been a wonderful resource that I encourage all EAL teachers to check out!" - Mallory

Mallory, pictured here on the left, also worked alongside EECD last spring to deliver online professional learning to educators on supporting multillingual laguage learners in all learning environments (face to face and online). The recording of the session can be found here. "It was a great opportunity to stop and reflect on what we can do to support our students in these uncertain times."- Mallory



ELP VIRTUAL FIELD SCHOOLS



It has been a year of development and growth in the world of education. With many programs switching to remote learning in 2020, the UNB English Language Programme (ELP) took the opportunity in the paradigm shift to expand their English for Speakers of Other Languages (ESOL) research, curriculum development, and delivery of programming introducing an expanded and new suite of Virtual ELP courses.

ELP has delivered virtual courses, combining synchronous and asynchronous learning, to English Language Learners from New Brunswick, other parts of Canada, and the rest of the world. From business professionals and graduate students to high school and undergraduate students, many have taken advantage of the opportunity to enrich their English language skills with Virtual ELP.

Highlighting four virtual courses this summer, ELP was pleased to continue their collaboration with the Province of New Brunswick to support young English language learners, as well as with the Shandong University of Finance and Economics (SDUFE).

Many considerations were necessary in the transition to a remote learning model of delivery. Maintaining quality instruction and delivery were key, while considering other aspects such as: time zones, digital lit-



eracy, balancing course load and life pieces, cross-cultural communication, and explicit processes to make the transition as seamless and as rewarding as possible for the students.

Working alongside Education and Early Childhood Development (EECD), Post-Secondary Education, Training and Labour (PETL), Immigrant Settlement Agencies (ISAs) around the province, and the province's Anglophone school districts, ELP accepted twenty students, aged 17-29, to the third year of the province's pathway to employment and post-secondary bursary program - and a first ever in a virtual format. Students took part in a comprehensive fourweek program combining interactive face-to-face classes

through Microsoft Teams and asynchronous coursework on D2L Brightspace, all with a focus on labour market training, post-secondary academic preparation, and digital literacy.

In addition, two courses for NB high school students, aged 14-17, were delivered. With a focus on developing English fluency and digital literacy, students met for ten hours a week to practice their communication skills in an interactive virtual learning environment, make new friends from across the province and have some fun.

ELP has been part of the Long-Term Integration Strategy Committee for New Brunswick for several years and continues to work with partners in a complementary approach to programming for newcomers. With a focus on population growth in the province, ELP looks forward to continuing to support NB's vision.

ELP was also delighted to continue their collaboration with graduate students from Shandong University of Finance and Economics (SDUFE), a university in Jinan, China. As a pathway into UNB's graduate studies in Economics, SDUFE students took part in a one-month intensive academic course combining both synchronous and asynchronous classes.

There is no doubt that there will be more growth and development in ELP's suite of virtual courses. With the fuel of having received very positive feedback from students in the variety of formats, this exciting new programming for ELP will serve as a complement to format offerings in the future. It will be exciting to see what the future brings in the evolution of the ever-changing educational landscape.
