Get To Know A TESL Member

Current Position: LINC and Literacy Instructor, Newcomer Connections, YMCA of Greater Saint John

I have been teaching English as an additional language for almost 25 years, both in Canada and abroad, 12 of which have been at Saint John Y. Before I started teaching at the YMCA in 2010, I taught English for Academic Purposes at Saint John College (English and academic preparatory college). At the same time, I completed my TESL certification through UNB.

What is ESL Literacy?

At our language school we believe that every newcomer deserves a chance for formal education, regardless of their background, age or level of ability. That is why

we offer language instruction in two separate streams. We have regular LINC classes, and Literacy classes – for those refugee clients who were displaced due to a war and whose education was interrupted, incomplete or non-existent. A lot of such clients were born and raised in refugee camps, having to survive, and without any hope for education. Some of them would not know how to hold a pencil, what to bring to class or how to learn. Imagine, you are 65 years old and today is your first day at school. How would you feel? Needless to say, learning will be a long process with a lot of obstacles.

Why is my job rewarding?


I have been working with refugees and literacy learners since my very first assignment at the YMCA in the LINC Program. Over the years, I have taken special courses, in order to understand my learners better and use the right strategies, teaching methods and approaches with them. My job is not easy, but it is extremely rewarding. I look at my students holistically, and I teach each and every one of them from my heart. I put myself in their shoes every day of the week. Love, patience and compassion are important qualities for a literacy teacher. My students have a wealth of worldly knowledge which is humbling to me. Their stories of survival will break and enrich your heart at the same time. They have so much respect for their teacher, and I want them to succeed. We work together at achieving this goal.

What is my personal goal?


In the past few months I have been pondering one question: what will it take to establish world peace for all? While we welcome more and more new refugees into our country and give them our best efforts, it is a never-ending "human river", or so it seems. There are millions of displaced people in the world who are grateful for our kindness, but they want to return home, to the life they used to have. But if they choose to stay, how can we keep them happy here, in this foreign land?

One book I have recently read and would like to recommend is "The Boy on the Beach" by Tima (Fatima) Kurdi, an immigrant to Canada who tells a saga of her family's escape from Svria. It is an incredible story of strife and survival. It has expanded my knowledge of the middle

Being an immigrant myself and having experienced the challenge of adapting to a foreign culture, I would like to be the kind of teacher that can guide her students along the path of their new beginnings and new hopes.



TESL NB's Teaching Tip

Use It or Lose It

When it comes to vocabulary acquisition and retention, one must <u>use</u> a new word to not lose it. In other words, vocabulary is retained the more students interact with it. When students are learning new vocabulary, take time to review and use the words in various ways with them. By saying, hearing, reading, and writing newly learned vocabulary, students are more likely to remember it, and as a language learner's vocabulary grows, does their fluency in, and comprehension of, the language.




To help with this, have students keep track of their new words in a separate section of their binder or notebook - like their own personal dictionary. Depending on their proficiency, encourage

them to avoid translation and instead write their own English definitions of the words. Encourage them to also write the words in sentences in order to give them context and show how they are used grammatically. Encourage them to draw picture representations of the words and try to make personal connections to them. The more they do with the new word, the more likely the word will stay and become part of their ever-growing lexicon. Explain to them that they will need to use it, or they will lose it.

TESL NB Webinar

Harnessing the Transformative Power of AI in English Language Teaching

Date and time: Saturday, February 18, 2023 (1:00 – 2:00 AST)

Abstract

Since December 2022, many educators have questioned the validity of existing academic practices and assessments and warned of a significant threat to academic integrity using AI tools like Open AI and ChatGPT. Others have seen this as a game-changing opportunity for better educational practices. English language teaching is at the heart of this situation, where technology is an equally crucial new opportunity and a challenge that could change many of our practices in ELT.

Al chatbots or Open Al technology uses advanced technologies like Stable Diffusion and GPT-3 to produce original and creative new content. Most shared reports discuss how Al systems generate ideas and relatively original smart content using a set of related parameters. This could be personalized to the writer's specifications in no time! Since there is no previous work for the student to copy, and, thus, not being detected as not original to most plagiarism tools. Most of these reports still ignored the considerable potential of these tools where practicing the language skills could be moved to a different unique level.

In this webinar, the presenter will give some background details about the recent release of AI autoregressive language models in developing authentic teaching and learning opportunities. The webinar will summarize how AI models work, how to use them, and how to integrate them into teaching and assessment with examples. The webinar will also highlight possible recommendations for better and proactive academic assessment planning to avoid the risks of AI generic content or academic misconduct.
